

What is Election Day like?

- Plan for a long engaging day.
- Election workers are expected to arrive at the polling locations no later than 6:00 a.m. and stay until the work is done. The polls close at 7:00 p.m. but there will be some cleanup and packing to do before you're dismissed.
- Dress in business casual attire that is comfortable yet professional. Be sure to wear shoes that will support your feet for a full day.
- Bring food and beverages to last through the day. Breaks will be given but leaving the polling location is not permitted.
- Remember to bring any medications, glasses or other items you will need throughout the day.
- Make arrangements for your pets.
- You can expect to receive your paycheck three to four weeks after the election.



How do I apply?

We are currently recruiting workers for the next election cycle to serve in polling locations throughout the county. We also have openings for bi-lingual workers to provide Spanish language assistance on Election Day.

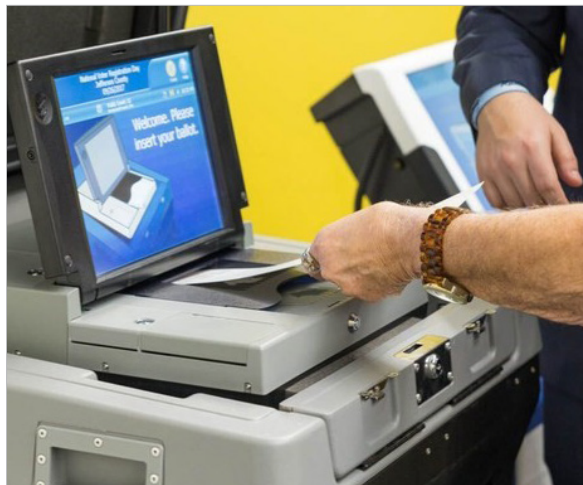
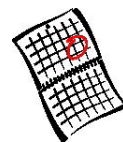

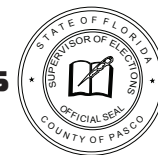

What are the requirements?

- You must be a registered voter in Pasco County.
- You must be able to read, write and speak English.
- You can not be a candidate on the ballot.
- You must have internet access for the on-line portion of your training classes, and be able to receive e-mail communications from the pollworker coordinators.
- Physical requirements are standing, bending, stooping, lifting 30 pounds with assistance, normal vision and manual/physical dexterity.

What does a pollworker do?

Pollworkers perform many tasks in the conduct of elections. Responsibilities include:

- Attending required training both on-line and in classroom before EACH election.
- Setting up equipment and supplies at the polling location.
- Checking in voters and issuing ballots.
- Assisting voters throughout the process.
- Closing the polling place and packing supplies.
- Returning critical items to a collection site after the polls close.

What are the pollworker positions?

Pasco County has 7 pollworker positions:

Precinct Supervisor

Responsible for overseeing tasks performed at the polling place.

EViD Specialist

Responsible for the operation of the EViD (electronic pollbook) to process voters including paperwork.

EVID Operator

Responsible for the processing of voters on the EViD (electronic pollbook) and issuing voting passes.

Ballot Distributor

Responsible for distribution of ballots to voters throughout the day and reconciling the amount of ballots issued once the polls are closed.

Voting System Specialist

Responsible for the operation of the voting equipment at the polling place including assisting voters throughout the day and modeming results once the polls are closed.

Attendant

Responsible for assisting voters throughout the day to include directing them and instructing them on feeding their ballot through the optical scanner.

Poll Deputy

Responsible for law and order at the polling place to include greeting voters and assisting them at the door.

Is training required?

Paid training for all pollworker positions is provided. Per Florida law, pollworkers are required to attend training prior to every election.

Training is specific to the position you will be working and takes place in a classroom setting. Clerical positions and positions that work with voting equipment include hands-on exercises with voting equipment and paperwork.

Additionally, there are on-line trainings required for each position.
